2015 CFIB report calculated a 17.4% compensation premium for government employees over private sector counterparts – the majority of this different was due to golden pension costs









2) Gainsharing:

 To incentivize employees to come forward with money-saving techniques, we recommend implementing a gainsharing program – a program provides employees with a bonus for ideas that reduce costs while maintaining output.



3) Managed Competition:

- Managed competition involves opening up government services to competition while having current employees bid to keep their jobs
- Eg. Indianapolis reduced pothole repair costs by 28% while improving productivity by 68%


